Home Learning Autumn 2 Year 6



Theme: Can one woman change the world?

During this half term we will be investigating where we are in place and time. We will consider whether one woman can change the world, looking at influential women from history, such as Queen Victoria. Our book this term is Street Child, a modern classic about a young boy who becomes orphaned and sent to work in a London workhouse. In Guided Reading, we will be reading Private Peaceful, a story about a young soldier looking back on his family life during the First World War. Our Science topic this term is electricity.

As well as the homework menu, we expect the children to complete other tasks throughout as below.							
Reading	Daily	Please read at home daily. This could be a shared read with a member of your family, an opportunity for you to read to an adult as well as time to quietly read and enjoy a good book on your own. Please record this in your reading record. Your reading record should be signed weekly by an adult, and you should bring it to school daily with your reading book.					
Maths	Daily	By Year 6, children should practice all times tables and division facts up to 12 x12. You can use chanting, singing, copying out the tables or practise using online games and apps. Spellings	Daily	 Look at the spelling list and practise the spellings. Use a dictionary to look up the definitions of any unfamiliar words. Write each word in a sentence. Choose one spelling activity to complete in addition to writing a sentence for each word. When reading, look out for words with our spelling pattern and add them to the list. Use your home learning book to practise your spellings. 					
Handwriting	Whenever you are writing in your Home Learning book	Use your spelling homework to practise your best handwriting. Remember to use an appropriate writing utensil - a sharpened pencil or a biro pen.

Design and produce a brochure for a resort that you are going to open on the Moon. What would you have in your resort that would make it stand out? For example, would you have a zero-gravity mini- golf or a water slide that careers you into the Moon's orbit?	Record the physical activity you do every week. Do you think you do enough? If not, go for a bike ride, scoot around the block, or try jogging (you will soon get your steps up!).
Whilst reading a book, keep a diary of how the character feels throughout. Do their feelings change? Why is this? How have they developed as a character?
