What we are learning......

For EYFS, please see updates on your weekly letters and Tapestry.

Year 1

Writing - exploring the traditional story "The Enormous Turnip" to write our own version.

Phonics - /ur/ in word, /oo/ in awful and could, /air/ in share and /or/ in author, dinosaur, floor, walk , /ch/ in match and nature, ar half, father.

Maths – how subtraction means numbers decrease and look at how addition and subtraction are linked.

Science - name common flowers and plants found in the UK.

Wider Curriculum – exploring patterns in Nature and observational drawing of parts of plants.

Year 4

Writing - introducing our next text 'The Man Between the Towers' focusing on the main themes.

Maths - continuing to look at fractions, focusing on quantities then ordering and comparing fractions.

Science - looking at our new topic 'climate change' and the impact it is having on our world.

Wider Curriculum - introducing our new topic 'landmarks' and defining what is a landmark.

Guided Reading – 'The Borrowers' by Mary Norton.

Year 2

Writing - using 2 versions of 'Goldilocks & the 3 Bears' to identify key features of fairy tales and write our own narratives.

Maths - addition and subtraction of 2-digit numbers.

Science - explore the features of plants and seed dispersal.

Wider Curriculum – developing our geographical map skills through exploring the journeys fairy tales characters make.

Guided Reading – Our new book will be 'The No. 1 Car Spotter' by Atinuke.

Year 5

Writing - using the new text 'Room 13' to create atmosphere within a spooky story.

Maths - explore volume, as well as scaling fractions and percentages.

Science - recap our knowledge of materials and their properties and begin investigating separation of solutions.

Wider Curriculum - learning what a sculpture is and exploring famous sculptures in the UK.

Guided Reading – 'The Lion above the Door' by Onjali Rauf.

Year 3

Writing - exploring a book called "Weslandia" and will recognise the features of a recount.

Maths - looking at data using bar charts and pictograms.

Science - learning about sustainability and where we can see in the world around us.

Wider Curriculum - learning about Ancient Egypt. We will be exploring different artefacts to see what they tell us about the past.

Guided Reading – 'You're a Bad Man Mr Gum' by Andy Stanton.

Year 6

Writing - writing diary entries in the role of a concentration camp escapee inspired by 'I am David' by Anne Holm.

Maths – solving fraction problems and looking at ratio and proportion.

Science - exploring how animals are classified into vertebrates and invertebrates.

Wider Curriculum - exploring the reasons behind WWII and the impact of the Battle of Britain.

Guided Reading – tackling reading comprehension problems.
