STEM HERO OF THE MONTH -ALAN EMTAGE

Alan Emtage, born in 1964 in Barbados, grew increasingly frustrated with the tedious task of manually sorting files at McGill University in Montreal. To address this issue, he developed a computer

program named Archie which could automatically search through files overnight.

Regrettably, he did not patent his invention. Despite Archie being considered the great-grandfather of Google and other contemporary



search engines, Emtage remains largely unknown and did not profit from his groundbreaking creation.

What we are learning......

For EYFS, please see updates on your weekly letters and Tapestry.

Year 1

Writing - we are writing descriptive sentences based on the poetry book "Out and About" by Shirley Hughes. We will learn to recite and perform a poem.

Phonics - we are learning the new vowel digraphs oy (boy), ay (day), ou (cloud) and ea (sea).

Maths - learning to count in 10s forwards and backwards to 100.

Science - we will be labelling parts of the body.

Wider Curriculum - we will be exploring the signs of Autumn.

Year 4

Writing - we are writing poetry and recounts based on St Albans.

Maths - counting in multiples, factors and multiplication and division facts.

Science - the relationship between the volume of sound and strength of vibrations and how distance affects this.

Wider Curriculum - The importance of the Abbey and reflecting on our St Albans topic.

Guided Reading - 'The Butterfly Lion'.

Reminders

Year 2

Writing - we are learning about rhyming poetry through our new book Kicking a Ball by Sebastien Braun.

Phonics - we are continuing to review phase 5 sounds.

Maths - doubles within 10 and using near doubles within 10 to help solve addition and subtraction problems.

Science - why exercise is important and the effect it can have on your body.

Wider Curriculum - we are looking at primary evidence in history and creating time-lines about change in Watford.

Year 5

Writing - biographies about Henry VIII and publishing into small books to share.

Maths - strategies to multiply and divide and solving word problems involving place value.

Science - recapping our learning of Human Life Cycles.

Wider Curriculum - how the Tudors are linked to Hertfordshire?

Guided Reading - 'The Miraculous Journey of Edward Tulane.'

Year 3

Writing - we are writing poetry based on our local area.

Maths - we will be looking at the measurement of units (e.g. cm) and starting to add 3-digit numbers by 1-digit numbers using mental methods.

Science - we will be learning about how to have a healthy diet.

Wider Curriculum - exploring two historical figures of aviation: the Wright Brothers and Amelia Earhart.

Guided Reading - 'The Queen's Nose' by Dick King Smith.

Year 6

Writing - we are writing explanation texts on the human digestive system.

Maths - we will be looking at equivalent fractions and comparing and ordering fractions.

Science - we will be evaluating the effects of diet, exercise, drugs and alcohol on the human body.

Wider Curriculum - we will be consolidating our learning about the canals and creating a canal lock.

Guided Reading - 'The London Eye Mystery' by Siobhan Dowd.

- Don't forget our 'Open Classroom' event on Tuesday 22nd of October between 3.30pm 6.30pm where parents are invited to visit classrooms to chat informally to the teacher and look at children's work. This in place of our 'traditional ' Parent's Evening usually held in October.
- On Wednesday 23rd October at 2pm Cherry Tree will host a parent meeting held by PINS the Partnership for Inclusion of Neurodiversity in Schools (PINS).
